Passport Extra pages in Passport Second form of Identification (Driver's license) Proof of Address (utility bill, official bill, within 90 days) for certain banks and account opening requirements Apply for a Chinese visa, but can also apply from Hong Kong if not enough time. Unlock your phone - most USA mobile phones are locked to their carrier and you need to ask them to unlock it. If not, you may need to buy a new unlocked phone in China. If you need a new phone, and buy Android, make sure to ask them to have a Google enabled Android (so you can get your email) Ask your home country's mobile carrier about roaming costs in China. You may be able to get a special plan to use your home country's mobile internet in China and it is awesome.

	blocked, they setup GetAstrill.com for Chinese viewers)
	Notify credit card company you are traveling overseas (so they don't block you
	when you use it in a foreign country)
	A method for you to have money wired from your home bank to your bank in
	China. Clearly understand international bank fees from your bank.
	Add a family member / close friend signed as a power of attorney (POA) for
	documents in case a document needs signing that is important while you're
	overseas
	Some business leads in the city you are planning to relocate to for jobs and/or
	business
	Accounts on English expat websites for the city you are traveling to, start
	engaging with active members
	(Bonus) Bring some "famous" gifts that represent your home city / country to give
	to new friends upon arrival.
	Western medicine - can buy in China but better to have some initial stock so
	you're not rushing to find a pharmacy and nervous about which brand to buy.
	Signup for a non Google Gmail account, Google is blocked throughout China -
	and as much as I love Gmail - you should have a backup email address in case
	you're not able to get into your Gmail when arriving in China. Set the gmail to
	forward to this email (and keep a copy in your gmail)



Once You Arrive in China

Be prepared to live out of hotels / AirBnB for at least a couple weeks so you're
not rushed into an apartment in the wrong area.
Try to not have too many meetings booked in your first couple days, prepare to
get over jet lag, get a bit adjusted to the area, and the food (may get food
poisoning as well, so be prepared - happened to me and I was not mobile for 2
days!)
Get a local China sim card for your unlocked phone
If your home country's mobile phone isn't unlocked the China SIM won't work - I
suggest just getting a Nokia phone for 100 Chinese Yuan (about 15 us dollars) at
an electronics market. But later, I strongly suggest getting a smartphone
Install Wechat mobile app, it is like Whatsapp for China, and everyone here uses
it - you'll need a Smartphone though -so that Nokia I just recommended won't
work - but you can use your home country's phone for internet.
Print business cards - Put your new China mobile phone number, and wechat on
it. Use this for all your networking.
Attend expat networking events from the English language group websites you're
a member of.
Keep an open mind - you will meet some interesting characters, but that is part of
the adventure.
Take up meditation, or at the very least, take some quiet time out of your new
hectic and stressful days. Try to keep your blood pressure low.
